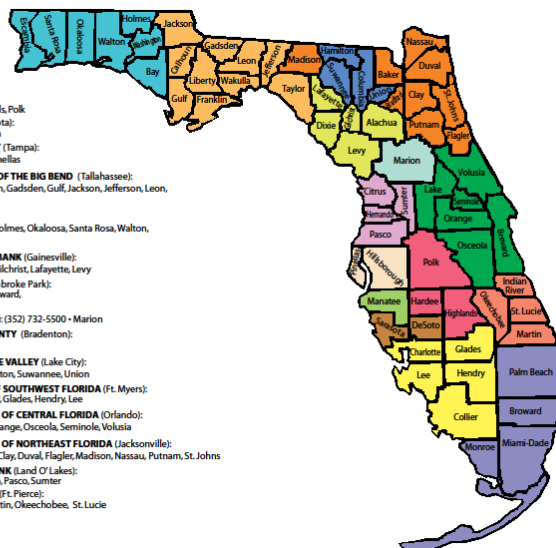

Feeding America Hunger Study 2010



- 1 in 6 Floridians on SNAP (Food Stamps)
- 50% choose between food and utilities/rent
- 33% of households have at least one employed adult
- 9% Elderly
- 11% Homeless

Top Ten States Where the Most Go Hungry



- **Food insecurity**
14.2% of households, up from 8.9%
- **Very low food security**
has almost doubled, increasing from 3.1% to 6.1%.

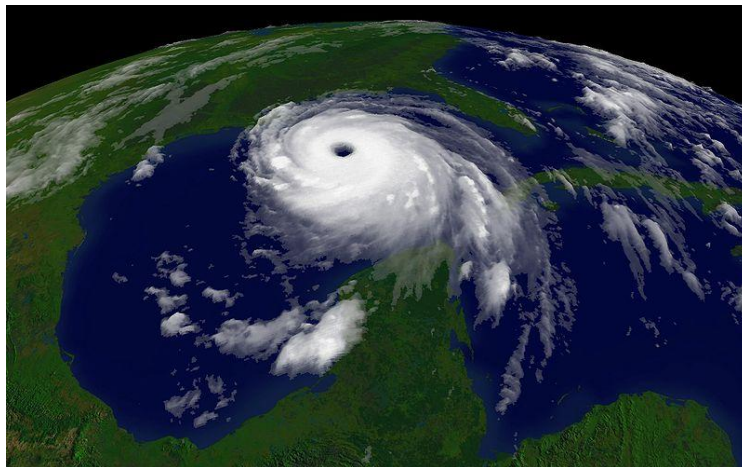
